WAS FIGHTING FOR BRITAIN

Rev. Henry Candler Hears of Nephew's Death on French Battle Front.

Lad Was Serving Mother Country as Member of Canadian Company.

An article has appeared in a news paper of Stamford, Ontario, which tells circumstances in connection with the death of Fred Lowe, a nephew of Rev. Henry Candler of the First Methodist church. The news article was in the form of a letter addressed to the boys' mother, a sister of the local pastor, from Major Guy B. Gordon. This latter person was in command of the son's regiment and had formerly been his pastor before the war in the ministry of the church of England in Canada.

Following is the letter which tells the sorrowing mother that she has every reason to be proud of the conduct of her son and his fortitude on the battlefield:

Belgium, Nov. 19th, 1915.

Mrs. E. Lowe, Stamford, Ont.:

No doubt you have already heard from official sources that your son Fred was killed in action on 17th of November.
