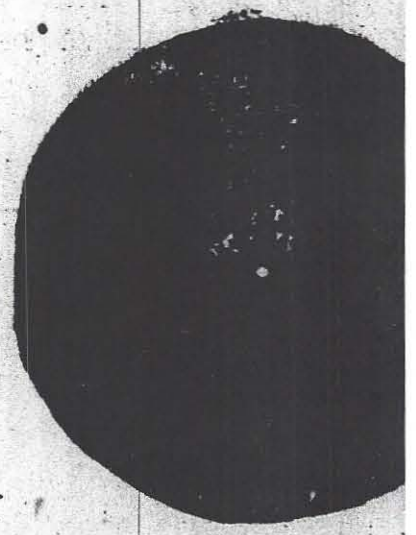
Two marriage licenses were issued

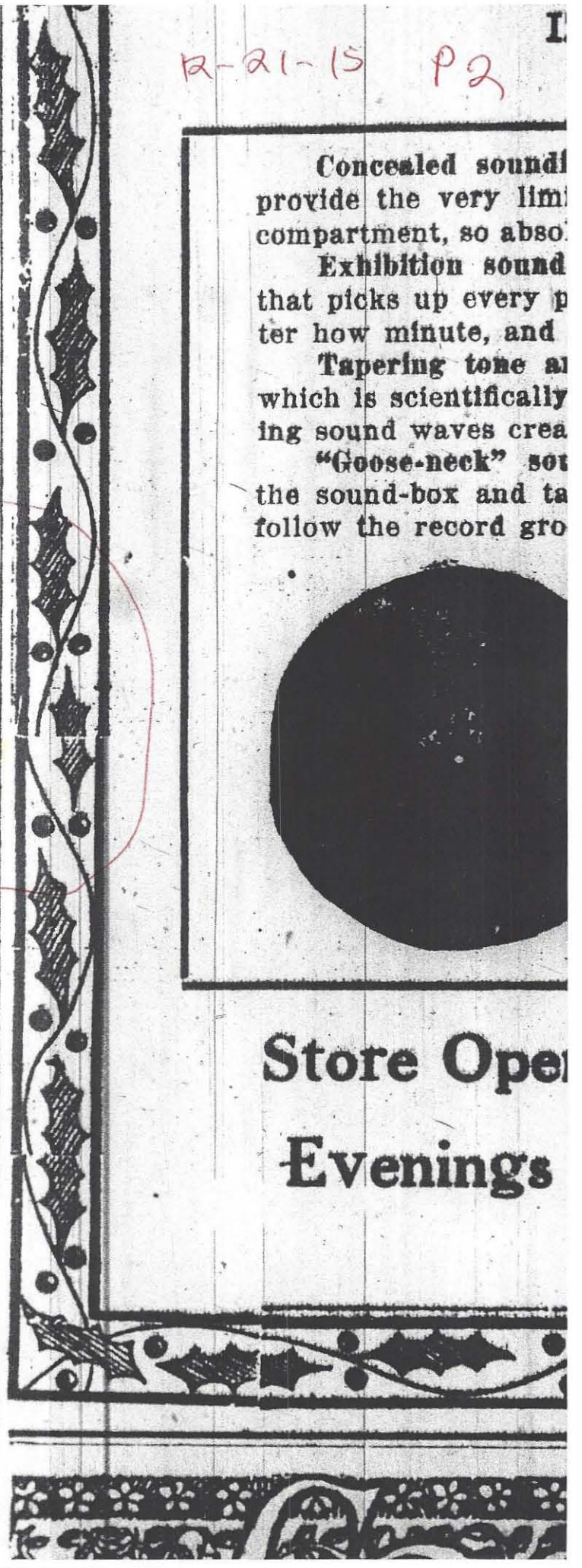

that it soon perishes. A tree judiciously cut will within six or seven years grow out again and training in the right way will improve the berries.

After the branches laden with the scarlet berries have been cut from the trees, the new twigs bearing the red fruit, are broken off and carried to the homes of the gatherers. In every home there is a busy scene, especially at night, when all hands find something to do. Children bunch the berries, tying two or three clusters together with fine wires; others cut off the leaves with scissors, while older workers wind the wreaths on frames of sweet pepper bush, azalea or other flexible young twigs, which look like a bunch of switches before they are deftly twisted into circles. An expert worker will complete 100 or more wreaths a day. Dealers pay from 5 to 15 cents each for the wreaths, according to size and the number of clusters of berries they contain.

Holly is hardy and may be grown in many places for ornamental purposes. It may be propagated by planting the berries, which contain the seeds, or by transplanting young seedlings, which is considered the better and surer way.

Mistletoe is less in demand than holly, yet large quantities of it finds its way from the Southern forests to the markets. The mistletoe is an evergreen plant with white berries which ripen in late autumn. The one-seeded berries are glutinous and readily adhere to any surface, like a bit of wax. Fruit-eating birds are especially fond of these berries, and they are carried long distances by the birds. The seeds use up what food supply they have in getting the feeding threads into crevices in the bark of trees to which they adhere, and thus get into contact with the sap that flows between

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# MAN NARROWLY ESCAPES WORKHOUSE SENTENCE

John Wolf, who is employed on a farm five miles west of the city, was arrested and brought to this city yesterday afternoon by Constable Austin on a warrant charging him with non-support. The affidavit stated that Wolf has two minor children and that he has failed to contribute anything toward their support. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace R. B. McCrory.

The testimony offered in the case convinced the court that Wolf was guilty and he was given a fine of \$50 and costs and sentenced to serve 200 days in the workhouse. This sentence, however, was suspended during such time as Wolf contributes a certain amount each week to the support of the children. If he fails to do this the sentence will be carried out. Wolf readily agreed to do this in order to avoid an extended visit to the workhouse.

The little Saxon roadster, the white car which has been frequently seen on Gallion streets, got mixed up with a Big Four switch engine Sunday. The engine pushed the auto along for about a block and when the mad drive terminated the little Saxon was found to be rather worse for its experience. The inmates of the car had a scare thrown into them, but were not injured.

Stewart is six feet, three inches tall, being the tallest student attending the academy. "I haven't grown any since leaving Ashland; I've just been straightened out a little," said the former Times-Gazette carrier. He told of the rules students had to obey. He makes a fine and attractive appearance in his grey uniform and blue cap, trimmed with black braid, and his regulation overcoat of olive-drab. Stewart's many friends here are glad to see him.
