Following is the letter which tells the sorrowing mother that she has every reason to be proud of the conduct of her son and his fortitude on the battlefield:

Belgium, Nov. 19th, 1915.

Mrs. E. Lowe, Stamford, Ont.:

No doubt you have already heard from official sources that your son Fred was killed in action on 17th of November.
