

A BABY IS POISONED

Innocent Looking Tablets
Contained Deadly
Strychnine

Child Died Before A Doctor
Could Render Assistance—
Sad Case

Gallion, O., Oct. 11.—Grace, the sixteen months old baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Blackford, residing one-half mile north of North Robinson met a terrible death, being poisoned by eating innocent looking tablets which were afterward learned to contain deadly strychnine.

The mother was busy at work and gave the baby a little round box containing these tablets to play with and while the mother was not looking the little one got some of the tablets into her mouth and ate them.

The child was soon taken desperately ill and a doctor was summoned but the little one died about the time the physician arrived.

The funeral of the little one was held today.

FOR GERMAN DAY

Plans are Made For Celebration
During the Feast
Of Ceres

Eight Societies Will Turn Out
and Join In Parade

Great preparations are being made for the Feast of Ceres German Day which will be on Thursday, Oct. 31.

Many Germans from outside of Richland county are expected to be present and are invited to take part in the parade. The parade will form at 1 p. m. The eight German societies will march. Each society will be represented by a float.

The parade will disband at the platform where the program will open with the singing of the German national song, "Deutschland, Deutschland, neber Alles."

Mayor Voegele will deliver the opening address. He will be followed by Rev. Mr. Keindle, pastor of St. John's Evangelical church, Alois Kessler and A. Kallmerten. The speeches will be interspersed with German songs and selections by the band.

The exercises will close with a very unique feature, the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," translated into the German language.

All Germans of Richland county and any visiting Germans who come to the city on German day, are expected to join in the parade and the singing.
