A marriage license was issued to Andrew Deck, 18 years of age, who was born in Cincinnati. His occupation was given as that of a clerk. The name of the young woman was Rose Schock, 18 years of age. Her place of residence was given as Mansfield.

The young people were married by Chaplain Kerr in the chapel of the reformatory, Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the presence of the reformatory officials. The bridegroom is an inmate of the reformatory, having been sentenced about two months ago.
