Other vending machines—such as coffee machines—are on schedule for 1957.

States represented by attending salesmen include California, Utah, Wisconsin, Texas, Alabama, Michigan, Conn., and Pennsylvania. Flexible busses and other manufactured goods are sold and used all over the world.

Here is the story from the beginning to the end:

One Tower Passed

Mrs. Gene Burgess had pulled up in her automobile, at about 8:35, to get her washing. Mrs. Brummage, outside her two-story home talking to Mrs. Burgess, noticed a van parked on the tracks. The van driver, who was very upset, told her the wheels were hung on the tracks.

The Pennsylvania Railroad has signs posted forbidding truck traffic through the crossing. The railroad has wanted to close the crossing for the past few years.

Alarmed, Mrs. Brummage got on the telephone and asked the operator to connect her with the tower. One tower is 20 miles away and the other is one and one-half miles away. The train, called the "Red Arrow," had passed the tower 20 miles away and was due through Loudonville at 9 p.m. The time now was 8:40 p.m.

Dozen Men Help

The "Red Arrow" is a passenger train with 15 cars plus a mail car. At the speed it was going the motorman would have had to spot the van a mile away to make the stop on time. Normal visibility at the Adams Street crossing is not more than 300 feet.

The tower man immediately waved the train down and the train stopped 50 feet from the van.

Meanwhile, a dozen men in the vicinity of Adams Street had come out of their homes and tried to free the van. McClure Motors sent a wrecker which enabled the van to continue on its journey. The van, reportedly, was loaded with furniture.

The "Red Arrow" continued after a 35-minute delay.
