MOHICAN — "A lot of us are against the attitude that alcohol addicts don't get better, can," nationally renowned alcohol counselor Cardwells told his audience Thursday at a statewide conference for the Association of Alcoholism Abuse Counselors.

Nuckols was a featured speaker at the two-day conference held at the Mohican State Park Lodge.

He said treatment and counseling for cocaine addicts and alcohol needs to be part of the fight against drug abuse.

"You can't have one without the other. We're all about recovery, trying to perpetuate that in the community," said Nuckols, who has more than 15 years of experience in the treatment of addicts and has written several books.

Nuckols also said that cocaine addicts need positive reinforcement. A cocaine addict's life is manageable if he can be dealt with reality, he said.

"All people need role models to help them establish their lives," he said.

Keynote speaker Paul I. Nuckols, of the organization's national headquarters, questioned whether progress has been made rapidly enough.

Ambulance

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Although 1st Ward Councilman Rex Elsass voted with the special committee members this morning to forward the proposal to the council, he said he would amend the proposal once it reaches the council floor.

Elsass said he backed the proposal because it would subsidize a private ambulance service.

"In my judgment at this time it is not necessary to do that," Elsass said about the proposed ambulance franchise — which he said would be an exclusive franchise for private ambulance firms.

Kahn said the goal of the proposal is simple: saving lives.
